

## NOTES ON AUTHORS

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DIRK Greimann holds a Ph.D. in philosophy from the Ludwig-Maximilian-University in Munich, Germany. He was formerly *Privatdozent* in the Department of Philosophy at this same university, and is currently Professor of Philosophy at the Federal University of Santa Maria (UFSM), Brazil. His main fields of interest are semantics, ontology and metaethics. He published several articles in journals like *Inquiry*, *Dialectica*, *Erkenntnis*, *Zeitschrift für philosophische Forschung*, *Grazer philosophische Studien*, *Kant-Studien* and *Facta Philosophica*, as well as the book *Frege's Konzeption der Wahrheit* (Hildesheim: Olms, 2003). He is also the editor of *Das Wahre und das Falsche: Studien zu Frege's Auffassung on Wahrheit* (Hildesheim: Olms, 2003).

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GUILLERMO E. Rosado Haddock is Professor in the Department of Philosophy at the University of Puerto Rico at Río Piedras. He obtained his Dr. Phil. at the Friedrich Wilhelm's University of Bonn, Germany with a dissertation on Edmund Husserl's Philosophy of Logic and Mathematics in the Light of Contemporary Logic and Foundational Research (1973, in German). He has published a book on Frege (1985, in Spanish), and articles in *Nominazione* (1981), *Kant-Studien* (1982), *Logique et Analyse* (1982), *History and Philosophy of Logic* (1986), *Husserl Studies* (1987), *Diálogos* (1992, January 1995, July 1995), *Manuscrito* (1996 and 2000), *Axiomathes* (1997 and 2001), in Thomas M. Seebohm et al. (eds.) *Phenomenology and the Formal Sciences* (1991), a brief expository article in the *Handbook of Metaphysics and Ontology* (1991), a paper in Walter Carnielli et al. (eds.) *Advances in Contemporary Logic and Computer Science* (1999), and one in Francesco Coniglione et al., *Historical Studies in the Philosophy of the Sciences and the Humanities*, *Poznan Studies* 82 (2004). He has also published a dozen critical reviews or critical studies in *Diálogos*, two critical reviews in the *Journal of Symbolic Logic*, another in *Revista Latinoamericana de Filosofía*, one in *Modern Logic*, another in *Philosophia Mathematica*, a critical study in *Axiomathes* and a review article in *History and Philosophy of Logic*. He has co-authored with Claire Ortiz Hill the book *Husserl or Frege?: Meaning, Objectivity and Mathematics* (Open Court 2000, paperback edition 2003), and has just finished a book on Frege in English, which is an updating, revision and expansion of his 1985 Frege book. Presently, he is also working on the philosophical views of the young Carnap.

JAIRO José da Silva (Dr. in Philosophy: Unicamp, Cand. Phil. in Mathematics: UC – Berkeley) is Associate Professor of Mathematics at Unesp, Rio Claro. He is also a senior researcher of CNPq and Vice-President of the Brazilian Society of Logic (of which Oswaldo Chateaubriand is the President).

JOHN Corcoran. After attending public schools including the well-known Baltimore Polytechnic Institute, he went to the local university, Johns Hopkins U for undergraduate study in Mechanical Engineering and then graduate study in Philosophy. He did post-doctoral study in Mathematics at Yeshiva U in New York City and at UC Berkeley. He has taught at Johns Hopkins U, UC Berkeley, U of Pennsylvania, U of Michigan, U of Santiago de Compostela and U of Buffalo (SUNY). His publications are entirely in logic: mathematical logic, history of logic, philosophy of logic. He is presently Professor of Philosophy at U of Buffalo. In 1999 the journal *History and Philosophy of Logic* dedicated to him a special Festschrift double issue. In 2003 the University of Santiago de Compostela conferred on him the Doctor Honoris Causa at an international symposium in his honor.

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RICHARD Vallée received a Ph D from UQTR (Canada). His dissertation was on non Literal Meaning (supervisor: Daniel Vanderveken). He visited University of Indiana (supervisor: H.N. Castaneda). He obtained a postdoctoral grant from SSHRC (Canada) and spent two years as a visiting scholar at CSLI (Stanford University; supervisor: John Perry). He was visiting professor at the Universidade Federal da Paraíba (Brasil) and the University of Alberta (Canada). He is currently professor at the Université de Moncton (Canada). His main area of publication is Philosophy of Language and he wrote mainly on plural indexicals (“we”), contextuels (“local”, “domestic”) and complex demonstratives (“that student”). He is also interested in Metaphysics, and more specifically on time, and in the Philosophy of Mind.
